He may have been seen as controversial, but he was a principled man who was ahead of his time and wanted to do the right thing for the game. He took me under his wing when I first made the Auckland team and he helped me earn my stripes when I could have been lost to the game through some average performances. We know how lonely it can be, even in a team! I am forever grateful to him for that. There was a soft side to Andy that not many saw. The committee, and can I acknowledge what a fantastic crew it is, is working hard behind the scenes, and we hope to confirm, via email, dates of further events in due course, as part of our commitment to men's and women's grassroots and local rugby. The club is helping sponsor a provincial Under 85kg tournament in October involving North Harbour, Auckland, Counties Manukau, Waikato and Wellington, which we would encourage members to check out. Deaths Of Members

Frank Colthurst (1938-2020)

It was fitting for a fine man of rugby that Frank Colthurst's wake was held at Northland's Kamo Rugby Club.

As a hooker, he played 49 games from Auckland from 1959-64, 27 for Thames Valley from 1965-67 and 45 for North Auckland from 1968-76. Nine All Blacks trials told of a one who was perhaps unlucky not to wear the black jersey.

A stock agent, Colthurst went on to coach North Auckland in 1980-82. He was also a member of the Northland Vikings club.

John Carter (1938-2020)

As a halfback, John Carter senior played one game for Auckland in 1960 and four first-class games for Auckland B from 1960-67. He was a life member of the Suburbs club and helped coach the premiers to the 1977 Gallaher Shield. Carter was also manager of the Auckland team in the late 1980s and early '90s. He was the father of John and Mark, both of whom played for Auckland.

'Dick' Hurn (1931-2020)

Dick Hurn gave sterling service to Wanganui rugby for more than 60 years.

He was a lock or prop for Wanganui (out of the Marton club) in 32 games from 1956-59 and in 23 games for Manawatu (Feilding club) from 1951-54. Hurn was a noted administrator in the Rangitikei sub-union, and was a life member of that sub-union, the Wanganui union and the Marton club. He was an inveterate collector of rugby memorabilia and was also a keen tramper.

William 'Haddon' Vernon (c.1930-2020)

William 'Haddon' Vernon played 27 games for Auckland from 1949-53 as a five-eighth/threequarter out of the Takapuna club, along with two games for Canterbury out of the Christchurch club in 1955. Vernon had three All Blacks trials and appeared thrice in first-class games for the NZ Barbarians. Vernon was a fine cricketer and successful businessman later in life.

Dennis Young (1930-2020)

Dennis Young was a fine All Blacks hooker in 61 games (22 tests) from 1956-63.

Not big in stature, he was big in heart and as tenacious as they come. Young racked up 137 games for Canterbury from 1950-63. He served as President of the Canterbury union from 2003-04. His work life was varied: cabinetmaker, teacher and founder of a travel company.

Andy Haden (1950-2020)

One of the great lineout lock forwards, Andy Haden was All Black No 716, playing 117 games (41 tests) from 1972-85, captaining the team on eight occasions. He also racked up 157 games for Auckland from 1971-86, winning three NPCs and leading the team that won the Ranfurly Shield in 1985. From 1976-86 he won no less than seven Gallaher Shields.

Haden was outspoken and pushed hard for the loosening of the amateur regulations. Later he established Sporting Contacts, and was a successful businessman. He was a driver of the Classic All Blacks on their regular pilgrimages to Bermuda.

As President AJ Whetton said of his old All Blacks and Auckland teammate, he holds a very special place in the Barbarians club. A large crowd gathered for his Eden Park funeral earlier this month.

Eroni Clarke: All Black No 919, 1992-98; played for Blues, Auckland, Counties Manukau and Suburbs club as a centre/wing; current President of Auckland Rugby Union; NZR Pasifika engagement manager

Simon Halford: Former Hawke's Bay, Manawatu, Central Vikings and North Harbour flanker/prop; also played for UK clubs London Irish and Leeds; coached Havelock North club and Hawke's Bay U20s; current President of Saracens club

Mark Hooper: General manager of Ponsonby club; former hooker for Ponsonby and Auckland B; 2019 assistant coach of NZ Barbarian Schools

Kieran Keane: All Black No 801, 1979; played for Canterbury and South Island as second five; long coaching career with Marlborough, Hawke's Bay, Tasman and Chiefs; life member of Tasman union; current North Harbour coach

Rocky Khan: All Blacks Sevens 2013-18; has played sevens for Auckland and Ponsonby; first five for Ponsonby and Grammar TEC; RDO of Ponsonby club; rare rugby mix of Fiji Indian and Rotuman

Lisa Kingi-Bon: CEO of NZ Rugby Foundation since 2012; former events manager for NZR; former King Country union board member; held various posts at South African and Natal unions in 1990s

Leon MacDonald: All Black No 995, 2000-08; played for Maori All Blacks, Crusaders, Chiefs, Marlborough and Canterbury as fullback/centre/No 10; former Tasman coach and Crusaders assistant; current Blues head coach

Heath Mills: Former MAGS First XV coach; helped set up Pro Sport at Auckland union; worked for Auckland and Blues; current head of NZ Cricket Players' Association

Tino 'JP' Poluleuligaga: Former Manu Samoa halfback, 21 tests, 2007-13; played for Pacific Islanders, Chiefs, Blues, North Harbour, Auckland, BOP, Toulon, Harlequins and Exeter; current DoR at Papatoetoe club

Karen Sutton: Founder of Auckland's Physio Rehab Group; long-time physio for Manu Samoa 15s and 7s; Samoan union injury manager; physio to Tall Ferns basketball; has worked with several other sports and been to Olympics and Commonwealth Games

Alfie Uluinayau: Former Fiji wing, 35 tests, 1996-2003; played for Auckland out of Ponsonby club and in Japan for Suntory club; NZ Schools 1988; has coached for Fiji and at club level in Auckland; joins wife Tammi as Barbarians member

Scott Waldrom: All Black No 1085, 2008; played for Maori All Blacks, NZ Barbarians, Hurricanes, Chiefs, Crusaders, Wellington and Taranaki as flanker; All Blacks Sevens player 2002-10 and coach 2016-17

Vaniya Wolfgramm (nee Lavea): Black Fern No 115, 2003-07; played for Auckland and World XV as midfielder; also NZ Sevens; NZR women's rugby development manager since 2012; created Pasifika Aotearoa Cup in 2013; provides SKY TV with expect comment on FPC games
