In that regard, whilst we are excited at the worthy projects on our slate, we are first and foremost a club – a society of invited members each with a common interest in rugby and each bringing histories and memories of their era in the game. Members need to meet at our clubrooms as they are able to according to their circumstances to keep the valuable lifeblood of fellowship flowing.

The recent Baabaas bowls teams' efforts in Mt Maunganui (televised by Crowd Goes Wild) was a wonderful example of that for me. The Auckland front-row of 1974-75 was there in All Black Brad Johnstone, Steve Watt and myself. Brad was a first-time bowler down there, as was All Black Jonny McLachlan, also a member of those '70s teams, along with fellow winger Sir 'Beegee.'

NZ BARBARIANS WOMEN REVIEW



Plans are afoot for another outing in 2021 for the NZ Barbarians women after the success of the 2020 team, which pushed the Black Ferns hard in two ultra-competitive outings in November.

Following on from a practice match against the Black Ferns in 2019, the team assembled after the Farah Palmer Cup for two full first-class matches with live TV coverage. Monalisa Urquhart, herself a four-time Rugby World Cup winner, was the club's liaison with the team and she reports that it was a good group that performed strongly.

Under the coaching of Rodney Gibbs and Chad Shepherd and the captaincy of Alana Bremner of Canterbury, the Baabaas were defeated 34-15 in Auckland and 19-17 in Nelson, showcasing the growing secondtier of talent in the women's game. There was some great theatre in the Nelson clash when the Baabaas advanced on the haka.

There's a Women's Rugby World Cup on these shores in September, so the likes of first five Patricia Maliepo, blindside flanker and skipper Alana Bremner, and lock Joanah Ngan-Woo could well feature then for their country.

Also on the Baabaas coaching team was Whitney Hansen, daughter of Baabaa Sir Steve Hansen, who has joined the Black Ferns as an intern coach. She is clearly on the way up, as is this relatively new and important team in our women's game.

BAABAAS NATIONAL UNDER 85kg CLUB CUP



The 2020 Club Cup, which was won by Auckland's Eden Lizards in a superb final against Auckland University Squids at Eden Park, was open to clubs from only five selected provincial unions due to Covid-19.

Former All Blacks coach and Barbarian knight Sir Graham Henry, a long-standing advocate for the grade, says: "2021 will see another step upward in ensuring the Under 85s are a very important group of players in New Zealand rugby. Hopefully we are not too far away from selecting a New Zealand U85kg team. Can you imagine the spectacle if there was an international under 85kg game between New Zealand and a rival nation?"

With a full community rugby calendar lined up for 2021, NZR is anticipating a large number of entries to a competition that has captured the imagination of clubs across the country.

President Bernie Allen watched last year's final with Alan Whetton, and they agreed that it was one of the best games of rugby in all formats the pair had seen all year.

Allen says: "Restricted weight rugby is rightfully on the up as it keeps players in the game and grows resources for rugby clubs longer term, with a lot of the Under 85kg players also being club volunteers, coaches, managers and referees. This year's competition is looked forward to with great anticipation and we can't wait for it to begin."

Bernie Allen is going to be a busy man in 2021.

Not only is he your new President, the 36th in the club's 84-year history, but he continues as the honorary solicitor and the unofficial club photographer.

Allen continues the tradition of Baabaas Presidents from the front-row (tighthead prop), though he is the first out of the Waitemata club since lain Abercrombie in 2000-01. At his investiture, he spoke of his Mt Albert Grammar and west Auckland roots. The need to build relationships was highlighted, as was AJ Whetton's 'tact' in his 2019-20 tenure in the hot seat.

His playing days included 15 games for Auckland from 1970-75 and a Gallaher Shield with Waitemata in 1975.

There was little other movement on the committee, other than Whetton replacing Neil Cullimore as immediate past President.

The AGM saw a turnout of some 30 members, including seven of the 11 life members, who heard about the club's 2020 season, an active one, even allowing for Covid-19's widespread disruptions.



Everyone knows of Ian Kirkpatrick.

But not that many realise he is the current patron of New Zealand Rugby. Not many also realise he was made a Barbarian when he was just 27, one of the youngest members in the club's history. At the time, in 1974, he was the captain of the All Blacks.

One of the finest men in black during his 1967-77 career, in which he scored 50 tries in 113 appearances, and a then All Blacks record 16 tries in 39 tests, the man they call Kirky is still held in the highest regard in rugby circles.

He is, along with his old provincial teammate Grant Allen, one of two Baabaas residing in Poverty Bay. At 74, he has retired, but keeps fit playing golf, walking and cycling and lives about 5km out of Gisborne.

Last year, he was due in Auckland for the September Sacred Heart versus King's First XV match for the Kirkpatrick-Fitzpatrick Cup. Covid scuppered that. No problems, he shot up to Te Araroa with another former All Black from the region, Andy Jefferd, to watch the East Coast club final.

But never fear, when Kirkpatrick is at home during the winter, you'll find him at Patutahi Domain watching his beloved club Ngatapa or at Rugby Park watching Poverty Bay. He soaks up plenty of code on the box too in between seeing his eight grandchildren growing up.

Kirkpatrick played five first-class games (for five tries) for the NZ Barbarians from 1972-77. He always loved his time in the famous scarlet jersey. The first occasion was in 1972 when he scored a try on Eden Park in a 31-16 victory over Auckland in a Commonwealth Games benefit match. His teammates that day included Wallabies Russell Fairfax and John Hipwell, Springboks Piet Greyling and Jan Ellis, and one Wilson Whineray in his final first-class appearance. There was a 1973 Baabaas tour of Fiji to savour too.

"It was an honour to play for the Baabaas. They were big games too, often in front of a big crowd on Sundays after club rugby (on Saturdays)," says Kirkpatrick.

"There was no 'knock your head off' stuff in those days. We wanted to run the ball."

He enjoyed the conviviality at 'The House that Jack Built' through the 1970s and has made the pilgrimage to the new clubhouse on several occasions in the last decade.

"Since the pro era, the Baabaas have found it difficult to operate like they did in the past, so you have to give them credit for hanging in there and continuing to foster the game at the grassroots level," says Kirkpatrick.

*Congratulations to Grant Fox and Gary Whetton, the latest life members of Auckland Rugby. Both were huge contributors to the great 1980s-90s Auckland rugby era. Fox remains the highest points scorer for the union, with 2746 from 189 games, while Whetton racked up 178 games. The late, great 'Snow' White holds the union record of 192 games.

*Congrats, too, to our patron, Sir Bryan Williams, for his long overdue recognition of the Steinlager Salver for his mighty contribution to rugby. By my count, 19 of the 22 recipients of the award since 1999 have been Barbarians.

*Another Ponies Baabaa, our esteemed treasurer, Grant 'Scurrah' McCurrach, was made a life member of the Ponsonby club. Over more than 40 years' involvement, he won five Gallahers as a player, three of those as captain, and four as coach, a rare feat, not to mention being one of the drivers in keeping the club afloat during tough times in the 1990s.

*Not to be outdone, Ross Cooper was awarded life membership of the Thames Valley union early last year. This honour was only just brought to our attention. Cooper, of course, is a former Chiefs coach and All Blacks selector who resides in Waihi, but he cut his teeth coaching the Swamp Foxes and is a regular presence on our screens through *Sky Sport Grassroots Rugby*.
