# Deaths Of Members

#### Murray Reid (1938-2014)

The Barbarians lost one of their great men when Murray Reid died in January, leaving behind a playing and administrative record stretching back to the late '50s.

A quick look at his playing career might indicate otherwise... 24 matches for Auckland from 1960-62 before injury took him from the playing field.

The tall and talented young fellow who left Whakatane to try his luck in Auckland in 1958 brought with him physical talent, eagerly measured by Freddy Allen and a way-out sense of contagious humour from his friendship with Terry Sheehan, the legendary spin-doctor from Devonport.

Allen was searching for a lock to replace Kel Tremain, due to tour South Africa in 1960. One favoured candidate was the Takapuna giant Don Bacon, perhaps more powerful than young Reid. But Bacon contracted the worst illness a lock could suffer – a big boil on the butt – and Allen had to call Reid into a squad with a threematch preparation for the Ranfurly Shield defences ahead. The second of these was away against Wanganui and very likely Allen wore a worried frown as his pack struggled against a modest Wanganui scrum and lineout. Then, 20 minutes or so after halftime, Reid grabbed the ball and with power and surprising speed he broke tackle after tackle and finished a 30-40 yard burst with a try between the posts. The old sweats reckoned Auckland must have a hard-core pack, and Reid had won his spurs – Lew Fell, Reid, Barry Thomas, Clive Currie, 'Snow' White, Geoff Perry, with Bob Graham and Waka Nathan as the rovers.

Reid did well with 10 matches in his first year, eight in his second, but only six in his third as a run of injuries – gaining him the nickname of 'Chalky' – finished his first-class career. Reid was such a regular caller at the Middlemore Hospital that they asked him to stay away; he had already filled one large cupboard with his injury reports.

When Terry Sheehan produced a menu for a special Barbarians dinner recalling the Ranfurly Shield win in Southland in 1959, he praised "Robert the Blue (Bob Graham) who would leave the wenching, singing, dancing and drinking at the campfire to go and visit brave little 'Chalky Reid' who always broke something in battle."

Fortunately, Reid did not turn up his Barbarian toes after so many injuries and setbacks, and instead worked his way up the Baabaas organisation from member to committee man, to chairman, to president and on to life member. - DJ Cameron

#### Barry Beazley (1927-2014)

Northland rugby has lost one its stalwarts and life members with the passing of 1948-58 wing Barry Beazley.

A long-time Barbarian, Beazley played his rugby out of the Old Boys club in Whangarei and emerged during a successful period for North Auckland, as it was then known. He was part of the side that won the Ranfurly Shield for the first time, with a 20-9 victory over South Canterbury in 1950, scoring a try, as did centre Johnny Smith. A big, fast wing with a long stride not dissimilar, it was said, to the late Auckland wing and Barbarian Lyn Russell, Beazley scored three more Shield tries and 19 in all from his 59 games for the union. He also appeared in the 9-8 defeat of Australia in 1958. Furthermore, he played 12 games on two tours for the New Zealand Maori in 1949 and '52, and his fellow wing in many games for both New Zealand Maori and North Auckland, Percy Erceg, believes with an ounce of luck he could have cracked the All Blacks, though he did appear for North Island and in All Blacks trials. He also scored three firstclass tries for the Barbarians from 1952-54.

A quiet, family man, Beazley managed the North Auckland team from 1964-82, often under his old coach Ted Griffin.



# MEMBER PROFILE BRAD MEURANT



Meet the incoming president of the North Harbour Rugby Union.

You'll recognise the name. Brad Meurant will assume the role next month after a lifetime of rugby within the union and when it was still part of the Auckland province.

The 61-year-old, who has lived on the North Shore for nigh on 50 years, has taken a step back from his coaching and astute radio comments these days but still keeps a close eye on the rugby scene, works as a plumber for 25-30 hours a week, and is a doting grandfather.

When we catch up with Meurant, he is laid up with a calf tear, but one of the characters of the game still has an endless array of stories from his time as a coach and rugby globetrotter.



His CV is extensive, starting as a prop with the Takapuna club, before racking

up 144 premier games for rivals East Coast Bays, while gaining rep honours with Auckland B and C. Retired at 28, he dabbled in coaching and within a few years had achieved the probably unique feat of winning two premier North Harbour club titles at each of two different clubs - East Coast Bays (1985-86) and Northcote (1989-90), bookending a stint with North Harbour B. His tenure as head coach of North Harbour (1992-94) saw the union through arguably its greatest period, defeating France, Auckland (for the first time) and Transvaal in the 1994 Super 10. Meurant rates that 1994 side, with no less than 11 All Blacks, as the best in Harbour history, as the 15-4 record attests. Then followed two seasons with the Chiefs (1996-97), one more at North Harbour and stints coaching professionally in South Africa, Ireland and Japan. But helping coach the Georgia Under 19s in the late 1990s might just top the lot.

"Georgia was my watershed. I thought it was a state in the southern USA," he quips. His Georgian story is detailed in that very fine book *Rugby Nomads*, co-authored by Barbarian Bob Howitt, but it meant he was coaching with the rawest resources. The players had nothing and washed their jerseys in hand basins. But they won the second division of the FIRA Under tournament in France and were promoted.

"Dealing with a whole lot of kids whose only way of getting out of an ex-Soviet state was through rugby was amazing," says Meurant, proud that several went on to play for the Lelos national side, a team that now rates in the top 7-8 in Europe.

A Barbarian for more than 20 years, Meurant is a regular at the annual Fun Day, and last year his grand-daughter was in one of the school teams he was looking after. He helped Bryan Craies a few seasons ago with middleweight rugby coaching.

"It's a great honour to be a member. The best thing about it is that you don't have to be a 'flash-harry' player to be a member, which I never was. It allows all sorts of rugby people to become members, for the right reasons."

### AGM REVIEW

The 77th AGM last November saw a solid turnout of members (around one-tenth of the membership) hear about another very busy year for the club and its associated activities.

**Bryan Williams** moved into the role of Barbarians club president, succeeding **Mike Mills**, who has served his two years and done a sterling job. 'Beegee' needs no introduction, but he will be a busy man with a finger in many rugby pies and continuing his role as director of rugby at his beloved Ponsonby club.

Immediate past president **John Mills** has now stepped down from the committee, as has **Bryan Craies**, both after many years selfless dedication to the Barbarians club cause. **Ron Williams** has been elevated to the position of junior vice-president and will continue leading the charge on the annual and iconic Fun Day in May.

Two new committee members were elected: **Ken Parry** and **Terry Horne**.

Ken, 55, joined the Barbarians in 2008. A loosehead prop out of the Northcote and Ardmore clubs, where he played more than 100 premier games for both, he appeared 15 times for Auckland and 49 for Counties between 1979 and '87 and sat on the bench for the 1987 All Blacks trials before finishing his rep rugby in France for the Bordeaux club. Since his playing days, he served on the Ardmore club committee for a decade and was manager of the Counties Steelers NPC side in 2004-05. **Richard Fry**, an old Counties and Auckland teammate, read the citation for Ken.

Terry, 71, is the unofficial club photographer and you will see many of his snappy snaps in the newsletter and on our website. He joined the club back in 1972, having come off a successful coaching period with St Paul's College, where his teams won five championships, including two 1A titles. He took the Auckland Schools



team to an unblemished record from 1970-74 and filled coaching roles with North Harbour schools, Northern Region schools and the NZ Schools from 1980-86. From 2000-12 he was senior lecturer in sports science at AUT University. A trustee of the Auckland Rugby Union Supporters' Club Junior Rugby Foundation, Terry was also manager of the NZ Barbarians Schools side in its inaugural year of 2012. **Kevin Barry** read the citation for Terry.

At the AGM, it was noted that Barbarian **Maurice Trapp**, the Auckland coach in 1987-91 during a time when Auckland boosted a record the envy of the rugby world, is the new president of the Auckland Rugby Union, succeeding Barbarian **Lawrie Knight**, who in turn succeeded Barbarian **Don McKay**.

Last, but certainly not least, the club took great delight in bestowing life membership upon one of its tireless workers and unsung heroes, **Rodney Doidge**. Rodney, who played eight games as a halfback for Auckland from 1958-62, served 16 years behind the bar and 16 years on the club committee, often travelling long distances from his Pukekohe home to man the bar with his smiling face and phlegmatic demeanour. His wife Barbara was everpresent too, helping out with food and assisting where she could. Well done, Rodney, and well deserved.

\*With respect to a query raised at the AGM, it was agreed to advise members of a correction to the membership subscriptions and bar takings' entries in the 2013 financial statements, as follows:

'Further to the 2013 Annual General Meeting and discussion regarding the level of subscriptions disclosed in the tabled accounts, the treasurer confirmed his discussion with the auditors and that it was their opinion and his that the subscriptions and bar transactions had been inadvertently entered incorrectly.

It was agreed by both parties to adjust the accounts to reflect members' subscriptions of \$13,800 for the year ended September 30, 2013.

The auditors confirm that, for audit purposes, they are of the opinion that the accounts are materially correct.



A random glance through the pages of Peter Minogue's 1961 book *Champagne Rugby*, celebrating all that is good about a level of rugby of which the Barbarians hold dear, was this little gem, relating to NZ Barbarians founder Hugh McLean, who never won his rugby cap at Napier Boys' High School:

'When his playing career was over he was one of the main founders of the famed Barbarians club in Auckland. His association with the club showed he was a great stalwart and enthusiast for school football and he spent a considerable amount of time in arranging matches with college teams and coaching the players during and after the event.'

Many of those Barbarians who played in these types of matches over the years will find this paragraph evocative and typical of what the club stands for and has stood for since 1937.

\*At this month's Halberg Awards, two other Barbarians were recognised. Richie McCaw was given the Sport New Zealand Leadership Award, richly deserved, while the incomparable Jonah Lomu was inducted into the New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame.
