# Deaths Of Members

### Sam Strahan (1944-2019)

Just last year, Sam Strahan, one of a clutch of Manawatu Barbarians, helped present the jerseys for the NZ Barbarians Area Schools team and was an active presence in any Barbarians activities in the region.

All Black number 657, the lock played 45 games, including 17 tests, from 1967-73, and 70 games for Manawatu from 1965-76. The big farmer went on to serve as Manawatu union president from 2003-06 and was a life member of his Oroug club.

In an article published in Rugby News after his sudden death just before Christmas, he advocated the return of rucking.

### Owen Gleeson (1932-2019)

Another elder statesman of Manawatu rugby died at the end of last year.

Owen Gleeson played 24 games for Manawatu as a loose forward from 1954-57, and went on to be a coach, selector, president and life member of the union.

His brother was the 1976-78 All Blacks coach Jack Gleeson, who also played for Manawatu from 1947-55. His son Mark serves on the Manawatu board, while his father William played for Marlborough and Manawatu-Horowhenua from 1922-30.

# Tony Aston (1938-2020)

A pacy wing, Tony Aston played for North Island Universities and NZ Universities (1960-62), scoring four tries at first-class level.

He played for the Auckland University premiers from 1960-63 before giving the game away early and giving great service to his club. He was president in 1982-83 and helped start up, with Mike Cormack, the Keystone Foundation, which established a sound financial position for the club.

An old boy of Mt Albert Grammar and contemporary of Peter Snell, Aston was a gifted middle-distance runner who was said, along with Mike Macky, to have persuaded Snell to give away rugby and pursue athletics, also introducing Snell to Arthur Lydiard. We know what came of that partnership.

## Peter Hall (1927-2020)

Peter Hall was a hard-nosed, no-nonsense, loose forward in 32 games for Auckland from 1952-57 out of the Otahuhu and Grafton clubs.

His nickname was, appropriately, 'Concrete.' Hall was made a life member of the Otahuhu club in 1980 and the Auckland Rugby Union in 1995, serving as the Otahuhu delegate to the union for some three decades.

His brother Ken was a prop for Auckland and Taranaki in the 1940s-50s, while his father 'Con' played for West Coast (also in league) and Buller around the time of the First World War.

# **BOWLS UPDATE**

Earlier this month some 12 or 13 Barbarians headed to Mt Maunganui for the annual Peter Johnstone Memorial Bowls tournament.

The likes of Ian Begbie from Northland and Adrian Clarke from Waikato made appearances, which were most welcome. Teams came from as far south as Taieri, Johnstone's old club. He himself was a Barbarian before his 1997 death.

Dame Noeline Taurua was a guest speaker, not long before scooping the coach of the year at the Halbergs, while her Silver Ferns deservedly won the big gong.



Now our attention turns to the March 15 11th annual Pat Walsh Memorial Bowls Day, always a highlight of the Baabaas calendar. Bridge Park Bowling Club in Mangere is again the venue and 8.30am is assembly time.

There is a further tournament on March 29 at Glendowie BC, in which the club will face off against the Carbine and Equiplage clubs.

Up for grabs is the Ladore Trophy, which used to go to the top NZ Barbarians middleweight player, but will on this occasion go to the championship team winner, along with prizemoney totalling \$5000 which can go towards a team trip.

This offers a prime chance to engage Under 85kg players before the season proper kicks off and is set to attract teams from all over the region and as far south as Waikato.

New Zealand Rugby is inaugurating a national Under 85kg club competition from May and this will lead into that competition nicely.

# AGM REVIEW



November 27, 2019 was the date for the 83rd Barbarians' Annual General Meeting, and roughly one-twelfth of the club (around 40) was on hand.

The highlight was the life membership accorded to both Sir Bryan 'Beegee' Williams and Neil Cullimore, both recent past Presidents of the club.

'Beegee,' of course, needs little introduction, as our patron and a great man of rugby. He's been a member since 1974, when he was just 23!

'Cully' wasn't much older when he was made a Barbarian in 1972, having won the Ranfurly Shield three times with Auckland. He was our President in 2018, and is still on the mend from an horrific cycling accident, but his quiet wisdom and knowledge of the rules mean he remains an integral part of the Barbarians.

Roger 'Mad Dog' Moore has retired from more than 20 years' service on the committee and was awarded a Club Shield. He has worked tirelessly behind the scenes at the clubrooms and in most of our rugby operations since the turn of the century.

Into his place on the committee comes **Peter White**, a member since 2016. He is the manager of the North Harbour Mitre 10 Cup team and was the trainer for the 1996 NZ Barbarians tour to the UK. Pete, as he is known, is also a long-time liaison officer for a host of touring teams to New Zealand.

Another extremely busy year for the Barbarians yielded a net surplus of \$108,190.
